Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD)

- In patients who have undergone a kidney transplant (status post or s/p kidney transplant), the provider must document the status of the transplant.
- The presence of CKD alone post kidney transplant does **not** indicate a complication of the transplant. Patients may still have some form of CKD. However, if CKD is a complication of the transplant, the provider documentation must make the link between the condition and the transplanted organ.
- A **transplant complication** is coded if the **function** of the transplanted organ is affected. Examples include:
 - Transplant patients who progress to end-stage renal disease (ESRD) requiring dialysis again
 - Transplant patients who present with acute kidney failure (AKF)
- **Documentation Tips**
 - Documentation should include information such as the disease process and an indication of the patient's dialysis or kidney transplant status.
 - All new symptoms that show disease progression, regression, complications, and side effects to treatment should be clearly stated in the record.
 - Avoid unclear verbiage such as "pt with ESRD s/p transplant 10 years ago." Does the patient currently have ESRD or is this a historical condition?
 - A provider's documentation of "renal insufficiency" does not mean a patient has CKD unless the provider documents "chronic renal insufficiency."
 - Providers should document the stage of disease in the final diagnosis.
