Using Remission Codes for Substance Use Disorder Diagnoses

Neighborhood Health Plan of Rhode Island (Neighborhood) conducted a detailed claims analysis that revealed inconsistencies in how providers are using diagnosis code for their patients who had an active substance use disorder (SUD) and are now in remission. Using a remission code means that based on provider's clinical judgment, the patient has achieved remission from the identified diagnosis. When providers accurately document current and past diagnosis, it

- ✓ Provides an accurate member record with remission as active diagnosis and SUD diagnosis in member history.
- ✓ Prevents patients from continually being identified as having an active substance use disorder they do not.
- ✓ Improves the HEDIS quality scores by removing members in remission from the measure denominator associated with SUDs.

Below are examples of codes that can be used to document remission in provider electronic medical records.

When using remission codes, the SUD diagnosis <u>must</u> be removed from active diagnosis.
