## NON-ONCOLOGY POLICY ACITRETIN (Soriatane®)

**For oncology indications, please refer to NHPRI Oncology Policy**

### I. INDICATIONS

The indications below including FDA-approved indications and compendial uses are considered a covered benefit provided that all the approval criteria are met, and the member has no exclusions to the prescribed therapy.

#### FDA-Approved Indication

Soriatane is indicated for the treatment of severe psoriasis in adults. Because of significant adverse effects associated with its use, Soriatane should be prescribed only by those knowledgeable in the systemic use of retinoids. In females of reproductive potential, Soriatane should be reserved for non-pregnant patients who are unresponsive to other therapies or whose clinical condition contraindicates the use of other treatments.

Most patients experience relapse of psoriasis after discontinuing therapy. Subsequent courses, when clinically indicated, have produced efficacy results similar to the initial course of therapy.

#### Compendial Uses

- Lichen planus<sup>3</sup>
- Keratosis follicularis (Darier Disease)<sup>3</sup>

All other indications are considered experimental/investigational and are not a covered benefit.

### II. CRITERIA FOR APPROVAL

Authorization of 12 months may be granted when both of the following criteria are met:

1. If the patient is able to bear children then the patient and/or guardian signed a Patient Agreement/Informed Consent (e.g., Do Your P.A.R.T) which includes confirmation of 2 negative pregnancy tests
2. The patient has a diagnosis of any of the following: A) Severe psoriasis, B) Lichen planus, C) Keratosis follicularis (Darier Disease)
